Project Activities	Outreach and Technical Assistance Reaching Community Based Minority Organizations Statewide		
Minority Awards	Three million dollars awarded to minority community-based organizations to increase awareness of minority health needs at the local level.		
Minority Community Based Organizations Funded	Since its inception, MOTA has funded 181 minority-based organizations to conduct outreach to their targeted populations. Tobacco and Cancer Coalition Meetings	Minority member participation at the community health coalitions for cancer and tobacco represented over one hundred and eighty (180) grantees, sub-vendors and recruited organizations/individuals.		
Community Health Profiles	Grantees and sub-vendors developed twelve (12) minority community profiles that described minority populations.		
Cultural Diversity and Outreach Activities	Various activities have focused on understanding cultural diversities within communities. Minority group participation included: <div style="display: flex; justify-content: space-around; margin-top: 5px;"> <div style="text-align: center;"> 1722 African Americans 938 Asian Americans 543 Hispanics/Latinos </div> <div style="text-align: center;"> 324 Native Americans 32 Women – only women focused </div> </div>		
Education and Health Awareness	Over ninety health awareness sessions targeting minorities have been offered by grantees/sub-vendors. Twenty (20) health awareness sessions were held in conjunction with local health department activities.		
Collaboration With Local Health Plans	Minority representation was enhanced in all twenty-four (24) jurisdictions to promote goals that address minority health needs. Eighteen (18) county health plans incorporated MOTA grantees as partners.		
Minority Outreach	MOTA grantees and their sub-vendors recruited over 180 minority community-based organizations to advocate for the health needs of the minority populations throughout the State of Maryland.		
Training/Workshops	Over forty-two (42) training/workshops offered by grantees/sub-vendors and MOTA headquarter staff to community-based organizations focused on grant writing/understanding, communications, capacity, infrastructure and team building.		
Other	One minority-based organization obtained its 501 c 3 status.
